

The Wildcats went on the road and belted seven home runs and plated 37 runs in a sweep of Southwest. They claimed the first game 23-11 and took the nightcap 14-1. "I think we scored in every inning all day. I don't know that I've ever done that in my career, so I'm very proud," said coach Michael Avalon. "Our hitters stayed within themselves throughout the day. They didn't get too big, and that's special. This group has a lot of talent. When they control their body and swings, good things In a game that looked like it was going to be a battle after one inning, Pearl River (27-7 overall; 17-5 MACCC) The Wildcats pounced on the Bears quickly in the first. Fulton, Miss. – Over the last three weeks, the college baseball world has come to know a truth that many at Itawamba Community College have known for a while. Houston Harding is good at baseball.



Harding's ability has been on

display all season for Mississippi State as he has played many roles from midweek starter to relief pitcher and back to starter again. In his last four appearances for the Bulldogs, Harding has struck out 22 batters in 17 and two-thirds innings and picked up one win.

"He's really talented and has a great makeup. He has good stuff and a great heart when he's out there pitching." said Mississippi State Head Coach Chris Lemonis during a June 7 press conference after Harding's 10-strikeout performance against Campbell University in regionals.

Most recently, Harding helped the Bulldogs win the program's first College World Series Finals game Tuesday night against Vanderbilt. In the lopsided 13-2 victory that forced a decisive game three, Harding threw four innings allowing only one run on two hits while striking out four. Hinds opens new terminal building at airport

Hinds has opened a new terminal building at the John Bell Williams Airport to accommodate pilots and passengers to the facility off Clinton-Raymond Road.

The new \$1.45 million terminal was built with multimodal grant funds from the Mississippi Department of Transportation and includes a pilot's lounge, a conference room, a kitchen, a grand lobby for passenger comfort and office space.

T want to thank our community partners because this really is a community project. This is to support economic and community development," Hinds President Dr. Stephen Vacik said during a ribboncutting ceremony April 28.

It replaces the terminal that has been in use since 1952. The airport itself has existed since 1942, when it first operated as a training facility for Dutch pilots flying B-25 aircraft during World War II. The facility was then turned over to Hinds County, which in turn gave the airport to the college after naming it for 1936 Hinds alumnus John Bell Williams.

"We've had the infrastructure, like the runway, taxiway and concrete that you see out here," Airport Manager Michelle Jackson said during her remarks. "But we lacked a facility like this to really attract the corporate clients we want to help build the economics of this area."



STARKVILLE, Miss.—As Mississippi hunters wonder where all the bucks have gone, Mississippi State University Deer Lab scientists are looking for answers.

White-tailed deer hunting is big business in the Magnolia State, annually contributing almost \$1 billion to the Mississippi economy. This timehonored tradition is why hunters and researchers keep a watchful eye out for the elusive, antiered mammal. In recent years, a noticeable number of bucks have seemed to disappear from their preferred home, only to return after hunting season ended

STARKVILLE, Miss.—A Mississippi State University scientist is partnering with a local lettuce producer and significantly improving yields and business.

Salad Days, LLC, a local greenhouse hydroponics salad producer in Flora ^{owned} by Jamie Redmond and his wife Leigh Bailey, has seen a 70 percent increase in yields and a 40 percent ^{increase} in profits in one year as a result of a partnership with Mississippi

After noticing decreased yields and a loss of nitrogen and potassium in their water used for the nutrient recycling system, Redmond reached out to Casey Barickman, associate research professor in the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station at MSU's North Mississippi Research and Extension Center in Verona. Collaborating with the scientist for various projects has greatly benefitted the farm operation, Redmond said.
